

The details of club secretaries were used to distribute the all-important Club and Judges and Lecturers directories by post in mid-August. Would all secretaries please destroy previous editions of these two documents as use of out-of-date information can cause embarrassment and even distress?

At our Executive Committee meetings we often find ourselves lamenting the number of clubs not using the PAGB guidelines for booking, reminding and providing maps to those who are invited to judge or speak to their members. Although these conditions can be found in the bi-ennial PAGB Handbook we feel that many club committee members are not aware of them – so this year these Conditions are printed in full on the inside front and back covers of the Judges and Lecturers Directory, which was sent out with the Club Directory. If you are involved in preparing your club programme or inviting speakers or judges we would like to point out that a reminder two to three weeks before

the event is necessary. A brief e-mail or telephone call a couple of days before the event is not good enough. Whether the reminder is by post or e-mail it should be clear with all details of the event, date, time, address of venue etc. Remember, your visitor is giving up their time for your club and should not have to make their own last minute checks to be sure their services are still required.

I would be happy for someone to join the EAF Committee in February at the AGM and work with them for one year before handing over the reins completely.

# Inter Club-Championships

It feels odd reporting about the 2014 Championships seven or eight months

after they took place but that is due to this being the first Bulletin to be published since then. Results are, of course, always put onto the Info> Championship page of the EAF website as soon as possible after the event.

## 6th Projected Digital Image (PDI) Championship, 9th February 2013

The PDI Championship moved to Fulbourn for the first time this year where 36 clubs from our Federation competed for the title of Top EAF Club. The judges were Judith Parry, Roger Parry and Chris Palmer. We were at capacity for spectators so tickets will definitely need to be limited to 130 next year.

We saw an excellent selection of images with the winning club, the Beyond Group, winning the trophy for the 6<sup>th</sup> time in succession, 9 points clear of their closest rivals Cambridge CC. Well done to Beyond Group.

As a result of this Championship the Beyond Group and Cambridge CC were selected to represent the EAF at the PAGB PDI Club Championship in July at Warwick.

# 9<sup>th</sup> Print Championship, 9<sup>th</sup> March 2014

Fulbourn was the venue again with 24 clubs taking part. Your club may not have entered the Print Championship because you think the prints are too small to see if you are seated at the back of the room. Far from it, we have a very accurate method of projecting the print images onto a large screen. This technology is done for us by Ian Wilson of Cambridge CC to whom we are indebted. The judges for this event were Sue Moore, Bob Moore and Roger Force.

As Cambridge CC got into the Final Competition at last year's PAGB Print Club Championships they gained automatic entry into this year's PAGB Club

Championship in October at Ormskirk. In addition the two nominated EAF clubs going are Beyond Group and Ware +DPS.

My thanks go to the EAF Executive, their spouses and all other helpers on both championship days.

# PAGB Club Projected Digital Image (PDI) Championships – 12<sup>th</sup> July 2014 University of Warwick's Art Centre.

Clubs representing the EAF at Warwick this year were Beyond Group and Cambridge CC. The type of images was varied – landscape, portraiture, natural history, sport and creative images. Neither EAF club got through to the Final where the top eight clubs battled it out for the overall winner.

#### The Plate results for EAF clubs were as follows -

Cambridge CC came =7<sup>th</sup> on 99 points. Beyond Group came =24<sup>th</sup> on 91 points. It is a tricky decision what to put into the Plate competition bearing in mind that those clubs cannot use any image that has been marked, in any future PAGB or EAF Club Championships.

It was good to see several EAF members who went to support our clubs. Thanks to Cambridge CC and the Beyond Group for their work in putting together their entry.

#### 2015 EAF Championships

There will be some changes to the rules in 2015 –Nature rules will be those of the PAGB. Other rules have not been approved by an EAF Committee at the time of writing this Bulletin. Club Secretaries will receive their Championships invite letter, rules, entry forms, titles lists and spectator ticket application in mid-October by email (as held by the EAF General Secretary at that time, so please update your club's contact details if there has been a change) and will by then also be available on the EAF website's Downloadable Documents page.

Spectator tickets will need to be purchased in advance for both events from Marilyn. Tickets are limited to 130 for each Championship.

#### **EXHIBITION SECRETARY**

**Saturday 3<sup>rd</sup> May 2014 at 14.00 hours** saw the opening of our Annual Exhibition at Wingfield Barns, Church Road, Wingfield, Eye, Suffolk IP21 5RA by our President Bob Norris EFIAP APAGB. This was followed by the presentation of awards and Projection of the Digital Images. I asked you last year to make it a good opening day and thank you – yes it was – standing room only for some!

Visitor numbers over the whole opening period were excellent and much higher than we have seen at the Gibberd Gallery, Harlow. This was of course helped by the fact the Gallery was open over the weekends and also on the Bank Holiday Monday. It was also pleasing to note that we received visitors from throughout the region, as Wingfield is much more centrally placed – even though the road access is "narrow" for the last few miles! Our new venue seems to have met with overall approval – I have received a number of comments from attendees – mostly positive.

It was understandable, even if disappointing, that the café was not able to open every day, as with the exception of the Main organiser, Sue Preston, the venue is run with the help of unpaid volunteers. However, they were very hospitable and welcoming – this being a bonus as compared to the Gibberd Gallery, which was not "serviced" at all. My thanks also go to Liz Cutting, Jim Price and Francesca Shearcroft who gave time to steward for us too during the Exhibition – it was much appreciated by Sue Preston and her team.

I was also told that the Pub was not open at lunchtime on the opening day for some unusual reason - so I will try to ensure that they know there is a chance of more trade on that day next year!.

I am grateful to a large proportion of the Main Committee, Alan Turner, Mike Dobson, Barbara Norris, Sheila Birch, Pam Hainsworth, Ron & Jean Pain, Chris Thurston and Adele Gibson, for their invaluable help on the selection days - and to the Exhibition Sub Committee and their partners for helping with the set up. Bearing in mind the nuances of the new venue, this was completed in a very efficient manner. At least next year we will know what to expect!.

Our three judges, Don Byatt, Leigh Preston and Rosemary Wilman also worked well together and provided us once again, as we asked, with a good range of subject matter across all genres.

### For those interested, the Exhibition Statistics were:

Monochrome prints: 160 (181 - 2013) members from 41 (47) clubs entered 403 (465) prints of which 99 (101) from 27 (28) clubs were accepted.

Colour prints: 216 (235) members from 43 (47) clubs entered 555 (636) prints of which 113 (134) from 27 (35) clubs were accepted.

Digital images: 268 (282) members from 49 (45) clubs entered 982 (1030) images of which 195 (236) from 45 (39) clubs were selected.

Overall: 345 (351) members of 51 (50) clubs entered work for selection; of those, 184 (194) members from 47 (46) clubs had their work accepted.

Scanning the result forms and sending them out by email continues to work well and is apparently appreciated by entrants. Many hours of hard work are put in behind the scenes to produce a very slick Exhibition of which we can be truly proud. I would also like to thank Barry Collin and Barry Freeman for the work put into preparation of the Exhibition Catalogue, which looks superb with the winning images on the covers. The award winning images have also been displayed on the front page of the website for several months – worth taking a look.

My thanks go to all the Competition Secretaries who completed the CD's with print images – it really continues to be a very worthwhile exercise and has resulted in much better images for both the catalogue, Portfolio and PAGB. I know a number of you were daunted by the task, but please be assured your work was very worthwhile and much appreciated by me. The timescale for our requiring the images means that there is no way I could cope with writing to everyone for just the accepted images and checking they are all received back by return.

I am planning to send out the Exhibition entry packs in mid November 2014 – (with the Annual Subscription paperwork) as, although they have always been available for distribution at the AGM, I feel it would be better for everyone to receive them earlier – especially as the closing date has to be early March for various administrative reasons – including the variable timing of Easter!. This will hopefully help everyone concerned and encourage more entries. I will not include entry forms this time – they will be available, as always, to download and even complete, from our website. This will save me many hours of printing – especially as well over 60% of those produced were unused.

The PAGB Inter-Federation Competitions and Exhibitions of Prints and PDI were both judged on the same day this year, in June. This enabled the results to be sent out all together – rather than split apart by several months as in previous years. Our overall position on the "league tables" as the largest Federation within the Photographic Alliance is not as high as we would like but the marking situation is of necessity complicated due to the fact that we have to provide more entries due to our size (164 entries in total). The marks are then averaged out (as some Federations are quite small) and this never helps. The selection of our entries and making sure they are submitted on time takes many hours of work, both for the Selection Committee and myself – as does the dissemination of results and catalogues!

Now, **turning to our 2015 Exhibition** – work is already in the planning stages. Wingfield Barns have been booked again – with the opening date being Saturday 2<sup>nd</sup> May (official opening time 14.00 hours by our own President) – closing midday on Sunday 17<sup>th</sup> June. Opening times, 10.00 to 16.00 hours. The exhibition will be open on Bank Holiday Monday and over the weekends (no weddings at the venue so far during that period!). However – in order to help Sue Preston and her team of

volunteers – we may agree to closure on Tuesdays and the middle Monday – which I feel is not unreasonable.

So please make a note in your diaries – then make a day of it - come along to see our superb Exhibition and enjoy the peace and tranquillity of the surrounding countryside as well. Incidentally for those who have not already discovered it – there is also a good sized Car Park adjoining the venue – free!!. I understand the café will be open at least on the opening day for tea, coffee etc. and cakes and possibly at other times too – I am working on that one as a fundraising opportunity for the Gallery!

Incidentally – if anyone relatively local, feels they can and would like to spare a little time to be a steward for a couple of hours – please let me know.

# Special Event with a Professional – Chris Gomersall Sunday 16th November Fulbourn Center, Home End, Fulbourn CB21 5BS

Chris Gomersall is one of the UK's best-known wildlife photographers, with



a 30-year track record of professional activity, including 14 years employed as in-house photographer at the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds (RSPB). He continues to work as a freelance photographer of birds, wildlife and the environment, and has undertaken commissions for WWF (UK), Natural England, the Environment Agency, and BBC Wildlife magazine, amongst

others. Chris's work has won recognition in numerous international competitions, and in 2007 he was proud to be named as the European Wildlife Photographer of the Year. (see image to right)

Chris will introduce the art, the science, and the magic of wild bird photography. He will share some of the joys and frustrations, illustrated with photographs from home and abroad.

# PAGB Executive Member Daphne Hanson DPAGB APAGB

Following my last report to the Bulletin, the Annual General Meeting of the PAGB took place in London on Saturday 12<sup>th</sup> April 2014, attended on behalf of the EAF by the President, Bob Norris EFIAP APAGB, Mrs Sue Dobson CPAGB APAGB, Ian Kippax EFIAP DPAGB, Mrs Naomi Saul ARPS DPAGB EFIAP APAGB and myself. Also in attendance were Mrs Barbara Norris, Mike Dobson and Andy Hanson MPAGB APAGB ARPS FIPF.

The Treasurer reported a surplus of £5,022 as at 31<sup>st</sup> December 2013, which is a lower figure than in 2012. The recommendation by the outgoing Executive that club subscriptions remain at £34.75 for 2015 was agreed. The 2013 Annual Review and the Report & Accounts as at 31<sup>st</sup> December 2013 were adopted and agreed by the meeting. The Officers and Executive Committee Members were re-elected with the exception of the KCPA representative who is now Clive Tanner FRPS. The date of the 2015 AGM was agreed as Saturday 11<sup>th</sup> April 2015.

Each Federation gave a short presentation of events and workshops that had taken place during the year. APM's seemed to figure most prominently as regions are holding advisory days and workshops and self-help groups. CACC were concerned at the high proportion of creative photography on the APM CDs and KCPA have scrapped their Federation Year Book, all information is on line.

Inter-club PDI Championship: Over 400 people attended this year's event at Warwick University on Saturday 12<sup>th</sup> July, sponsored by Darwin Clayton (UK) Ltd and Fotospeed, with 14 companies donating Raffle prizes. The competition was won by Smethwick Photographic Society of the Midland Counties PF. Next year's event will take place on Saturday 11<sup>th</sup> July 2015.

**Inter-club Print Championship:** The venue for 2014 has been changed and the competition this year will be held at Edge Hill University, St Helens Road, Ormskirk, Lancashire on Saturday 25<sup>th</sup> October 2014 in a 400 seat tiered theatre. This venue has also been booked for 2015 for Saturday 24<sup>th</sup> October.

# **Inter-Federation Print & Projected Digital Image Competitions/Exhibitions:**

Both Competitions/Exhibitions were judged on Sunday 8<sup>th</sup> June, hosted by the Welsh Photographic Federation, at Talbot Green Nr Llantrisant and, for the first time, open to the public.

The Monochrome Print Competition and the Open PDI Competition was won by the Midland Counties Photographic Federation. The Colour Print Competition and the Nature PDI Competition was won by the North & East Midlands Photographic Federation. Gold and Silver Medals, together with PAGB Ribbons were awarded by the Selectors, Jan Cawley EFIAP/s, Bill Hall AFIAP DPAGB ABPE & Peter Gennard MFIAP EFIAP/p. Next year's Inter-Federation Competitions will be judged on Saturday 13<sup>th</sup> June, hosted by Kent County Photographic Association, and open to the public by ticket only.

Nature Definition: Notes to the PAGB Definition adopted for PAGB competitions were added to the PAGB website. However, at the time of writing, FIAP, RPS and the PSA have all agreed a common definition for Nature and Wildlife and in order for consistency throughout all competitions, exhibitions and salons; the PAGB Executive has agreed to adopt this new definition which will be ratified at the PAGB meeting in October. The new definition is published on the PAGB website: www.thepagb.org.uk and, subject to ratification, will be adopted for the PAGB Print Championship in October and for all PAGB competitions as from January 2015. PAGB competitions do not have a Wildlife category and Wildlife criteria do not apply.

Awards for Photographic Merit – Audio Visual: New Rules for APM's in AV for CPAGB, DPAGB and MPAGB were agreed by the PAGB and a leaflet describing the new procedures can be downloaded from: www.thepagb.org.uk/merit.htm. There has been limited interest so far in applying for an APM/AV and it is likely that adjudications will not take place until 2015.

**APM Mentors:** The PAGB are looking to publish a list of people who are prepared to offer advice to anyone wanting to apply for an Award for Photographic Merit.

**PAGB Judges:** Ross McKelvey MPAGB ARPS BPE3\* (NIPA) Howard Tate MA (Phot) ARPS AFIAP (YPU) and Richard Spurdens DPAGB EFIAP (YPU) have been appointed to the Judges list.

**PAGB Great British Cup:** In 2014, 100 clubs entered the Open section, 63 clubs in the Small Clubs category and 101 clubs in Nature. Judging took place on 8<sup>th</sup>, 9<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> February. The new on-line entry system worked well although there were some teething problems. CDs for each category will be sent to participating clubs in August 2014. The Open & Nature sections were won by Wigan 10 and the Small Clubs section by Duston CC. A CD of all the shows can be hired from the Recorded Lecture Service.

**Recorded Lecture Service:** CDs of the Awards for Photographic Merit continue to be the most popular, followed by 'The Art of Photography' by Sir George Pollack. RLS Secretary, Stephanie Cook, is seeking new lectures, especially Nature CDs, can you help, if so, please contact me?

**PAGB Website:** The new website is progressing and will eventually encompass the websites for e-news, the GB Cup and the Inter-Federation Competitions.

**Insurance:** There has been no increase in the premiums for 2014. Worldwide cover is now provided on the basis that the club and member are based within the UK. Clubs should note that the Members 'All Risks' Insurance does not provide cover for professional or semi-professional photographers, only amateurs. Visiting speakers not listed in the PAGB Handbook should have their own Public Liability Insurance as they are not covered under the PAGB policy.

**'On-line' or 'virtual' Clubs:** As from 1<sup>st</sup> February 2015 a new definition of a club is expected to be adopted by our Insurers. The PAGB agreed to adopt this definition with immediate effect:

'A camera club, photographic society, photographic club or photographic group with a published constitution and published programme of events, united by a common interest in photography, meeting in person for mutual co-operation, education, entertainment or competition and conducted solely from a physical location within Great Britain, Northern Ireland, the Channel Islands or the Isle of Man'.

**Award for Meritorious Service:** Awarded to Lynn Lambeth - Southern Counties Photographic Federation.

**Sponsorship & Fundraising:** The PAGB stall at The Photography Show was a great success and well supported. Next year's event is scheduled for  $21^{st} - 24^{th}$  March 2015 when the PAGB stall will be in Hall 5 of the National Exhibition Centre.

#### **Judges Officer Report**

There was a Judges Workshop held on the 10th August at Foxton, Nr. Cambridge and there were two workshops for New Judges and one workshop as a refresher for existing Judges.

I am very pleased to report that Pauline Martindale has been promoted to the B panel and we have listed four new judges on the C panel. These are, John Butler and Dianne Gibson of Bunwell & District CC, Rex Makemson of Hunstanton Camera Club and John Wilcox of Wisbech & District CC.

Whilst fully appreciating that club programs are put together quite a long way in advance the, Executive would ask that if at all possible you can book these new judges for your club competitions.

# A View on EAF Exhibition 2014 by Caroline Bailey, Hertford Camera Club

For many years the cry from the northern reaches of the EAF was 'Harlow is too far', 'Spread the exhibitions fairly', 'Use Norwich or Ely as a base. The excellent, well-lit venue at the Gibberd Gallery in Harlow with the adjacent Asda car-park was ideal for us members associated with Hertford Camera Club. The journey was short, the parking was cheap, and the opening day presentation of medals and cups went well. The PDIs were projected in a large theatre with comfortable chairs, a large screen, and room for all.

The voices from the north were persistent, and this year, under the new and highly competent arm of Naomi Saul the venue was moved to a little known location in the middle of nowhere called Wingfield Barns. This proved to be to the southeast of Diss, a generous two to two and a half hours drive from Hertford depending on whether you liked the M11 or A10 and the A14, or the pretty way.

The roads were twisty and lumpy, but the directions were excellent, and the parking was free. Wingfield Barns is a popular site for wedding receptions, and consists of several huge barns called studios which are painted white. The DPIs were projected onto a suitable wall at the end of a long, narrow room, and while clear to all those who had seats for some it was 'standing room only', or a removal to another barn to see the images on a monitor.

The prints were displayed, supported by two aluminium rails at just above and below head height, in two large, airy rooms. It was only later revealed that screwing these supports into place was only one of the tasks undertaken by the hanging team in the few short days prior to opening.

Both the projected images and the prints contained many superb examples of photographic excellence, inspiration, and not a little manipulation. Diverse images ranged from a close up and personal portrait of two gannets, to a ballerina adjusting her footwear. There was plenty of natural history, an angry puma, and the feeding of a family of kingfishers, being abiding memories. Portraits were varied, many being set against the context to which they related. Landscapes were there, but perhaps in lower frequency than previously. Monochrome images are always eye-catching, and studies of the south coast and of ploughed fields were excellent examples of the genre. HDR interpretation was in evidence as a popular technique, used in subtle, acceptable and excessive amounts. The same could be said for sharpening, and for contrast enhancement. There were many brilliant images, and a few that would prompt the question 'Why was that chosen?'

When the exhibition was in Harlow people in regular hours of employment had to attend the opening ceremony or miss out entirely as opening hours were restricted to week days in the day time only. At Wingfield Barns access to the exhibition is available for two weeks, including the weekends. Tea, coffee and cakes were available on site.

The weather on opening day was on our side for the journey, 'cloudy-bright' being the common situation. The sunny spells were in short supply, especially nearer to the venue itself, so opportunities to catch the East Anglian light in a memorable image were few and far between. A journey through the English countryside when it is looking its best is always a pleasure, and there was plenty of accommodation available in the vicinity of Diss for those who wanted to make a weekend of it. We enjoyed the journey, and the show in its new venue. Next year we shall hope for weather that gives more photographic inspiration, and will leave more time for those attractive villages we passed through on the way.

Thank you Naomi and your hard-working team for a first class show in an exciting new venue. We give it our stamp of approval.

# OBITUARY WILLIAM R 'BILL' LARMAN SHILLINGTON AND DISTRICT CAMERA CLUB

Bill Larman died on 8 February 2014 aged 79.

He joined Shillington and District Camera Club in 1970 and became President in 1974; a post he held for two years. He served as a committee member during 1976 and 1977 and was elected Competition Secretary in 1978 in succession to Gerry Froy.

Bill and his wife Gladys were made Honorary Life members in 1992 in recognition of their generous service to the club and in 1997 Bill received the Award of the Photographic Alliance of Great Britain (APAGB) in recognition of his contribution to the administration of club and amateur photography.

Although Bill retired as Competition Secretary in 2005 he continued to serve as a committee member for a further three years when he finally stepped back from active club life, having been in office continuously for almost thirty-six years.

Bill's total commitment and support for so many years is one landmark in the club's history and provides a fitting memorial to a good friend. Those of us who were privileged to know Bill will remember him fondly and with gratitude.
