TREASURER – January 2017

As I write this article in December 2016, before the current year end figures are fully completed, knowing that it will not be published until we are about one month into the new financial year, my comments are far from easy! As I used "worst case scenario" figures for our Budget back in December 2015, the forecast for 2016 showed a projected deficit of about £1000. However, I am pleased to be able to report that the actual figures once again are set to show a surplus in the region of £750, despite a substantial equipment purchase.

During 2016, Clubs remained buoyant - and Club "Individual" Membership numbers, although lower, were still about 150 over the figure used for our forecast – which means Subscription receipts were some £350 higher than predicted. At the time of writing however, the declared club membership numbers for 2017 are showing an overall reduction – but hopefully they will still remain within the 4700 member figure used for the Budget forecast in 2017. This of course means there is again less of a "hidden resource" available on the income forecast. Interest received on investments, although in line with Budget forecast for 2016 have, as we all know (!!) dropped very significantly to negligible figures, so I have amended the 2017 forecast accordingly.

When you receive your copies of the Accounts to 31 December 2016, you will see that in most cases expenses are well within budget, due to the continued vigilance of the Executive Committee cutting costs wherever possible. Continued use of the internet for the despatch of the majority of our communications saves the Federation expensive printing, stationery and postage cost; although we appreciate it does cost the recipients more, as many of the items still ultimately need printing.

I am pleased to say that with our General Reserve Account continuing to grow and being sufficient to cover a good 18 months of Expenditure - I will not be recommending an increase in the Subscriptions as far as the EAF is concerned for the 13th consecutive year - even though the forecast for next year predicts a "worst case" deficit in the region of £1700.

PAGB Inter-Club Print Championships 2016

The PAGB Inter-Club Print Championships for 2016 took place at Ormskirk on 6th November. The EAF was represented by Beyond Group and Cambridge Camera Club.

Scott Coe of Beyond Group reports:

"The day got off to great start with the judges quickly finding their feet after a few warm up prints and the high scores started to flow. After a number of images scoring the magic 15 points, it meant that the scoring was very tight at the top of the scoreboard with only a few points separating the top 10 clubs. The judges had their preferred styles with creative images scoring well, nudes not scoring so well, but it was good to see some very good landscapes receiving high scores.

Unfortunately, come the end of the 12 rounds, neither Beyond Group nor Cambridge qualified for the finals. Wigan 10 went on to win the PAGB Print Championships with an excellent set of images.

To help celebrate the 20th anniversary there were additional awards and small gifts for all. It was a great day out all-round, and it only remains to thank Rod Wheelans for all his efforts over the past 20 years."

As a small consolation for the EAF, Anne Miles of Cambridge Camera Club was awarded a PAGB Ribbon for her mono image "House on the Fjord".

EAF PDI AND PRINT CLUB CHAMPIONSHIPS 2017

The 2017 Championships are fast approaching. Both take place at the Fulbourn Centre near Cambridge:

The PDI Championship on Sunday 5^{th} February starting no earlier than 11.00 (we start the day at 10.00 with the AGM, so there has to be a little flexibility in the timing of the Championship)

The Print Championship is on Sunday 12th March at 10.45.

The closing date for entry to the PDI Championship (15th January) has probably passed by now, but the closing date for the Print Championship is not until 19th February so it may still be possible for your Society or Club to put in an entry, if they have not already done so.

Tickets for both Championships are available now: an application form is available on the website under Info> Downloadable Documents> Club Championships 2017. Even if your Society is not entering either or both Championships this year, you are still eligible to come along and see other people's images. However, please do buy in advance, rather than just turning up on the day, as the Championships are always popular and there may not be any tickets available on the door.

This will be both my first and my last year as Championship Secretary. I had intended to do the job for several years, like my predecessor; but I now find that, for personal reasons, I need to stand down. Hopefully a successor will have been identified by the time you read this, so that they can be elected to the EAF Executive Committee at the AGM.

Having said that, the Championships are not down to just one person and we have quite a sizeable team working at both events, particularly the Print Championship when several hundred prints need to be sorted and handled on the day, and it would be helpful to have a few more volunteers. PA Executive Member Daphne Hanson DPAGB APAGB

The last meeting of the Photographic Alliance took place in London on 1st/2nd October 2016. The next meeting is scheduled for 4th/5th February 2017.

Finance: The Executive agreed that the PAGB travelling expenses remain unchanged at 30p per mile, plus fuel. The Finance Committee reported that the level of reserves at the end of 2015 stand at General Account £54,000, FIAP Biennial Fund £15,000 and Sponsorship Fund £12,000. **FIAP:** All 110 applications for FIAP Distinctions were successful. It was agreed that in addition to using Distinction applicants' images for FIAP Biennial entries, the images could also be used for FIAP Exhibitions. Photographers whose images are used in FIAP Biennials will be notified and informed of the results. Medals will be awarded when the PAGB host the Biennial and a Special Certificate for other Biennials. The fee for FIAP Distinction applications remains at the current level for 2017 even allowing for the unfavourable exchange rate with the Euro.

Dave Coates presented the meeting with a Silver Plaque received from FIAP which he accepted on behalf of the PAGB at the FIAP Congress held in Korea in August 2016. This was in recognition of the PAGB successfully hosting the FIAP Colour Print Biennial in 2016. Dave also reported on the FIAP Congress, noting in particular the ruling that judges can only judge 3 salons holding FIAP Patronage in any one year in any one country in any one category. He agreed to monitor this and to inform any judge who may reach this limitation

The new FIAP Life Card, an updated version of the Photo-Card with a hologram to combat forgery was agreed. This will also carry an identification number unique and permanent to each card holder and used to verify salon results and distinction applications.

The 11th FIAP World Cup was organised and judged in Smethwick in December 2016. The PAGB member of the jury was John Chamberlin MFIAP. The World Cup was awarded to Smethwick Photographic Society, closely followed in second place by Arden Photo Group. 176 clubs entered from all over the World with PAGB clubs taking 8 places in the top 12. The Award presentation ceremony will take place at Smethwick Clubrooms in April 2017.

The 33rd FIAP Monochrome Print Biennial was won by the PAGB for an entry of 10 prints on the subject of "Sport".

The 18th FIAP Nature PDI Biennial was run by Serbia with the PAGB submitting 20 PDI images on a theme of "Birds Feeding Time". The PAGB won a FIAP Gold Medal for second place.

Inter-Federation Print & Projected Digital Image Competitions & Exhibitions: The 2017 Competitions/Exhibitions sponsored by Sony will be judged on Saturday 3rd June at Carlton Grange Community Centre, Pontefract hosted by the Yorkshire Photographic Union. The judges will be Anne Greiner MPAGB, Howard Tate MA (Phot) ARPS AFIAP and Jan Cawley EFIAP/s.

Inter-Club PDI Championship: The event in 2017 will take place at Warwick University on Saturday 15th July sponsored by Darwin Clayton (UK) Ltd and Fotospeed.

Inter-Club Print Championship: The 20th Print Championship was held at Ormskirk High School on Sunday 6th November 2016. Each ticket holder was presented with a small gift, the gifts being donated by each Federation depicting

their area of the country. Our contribution of 20 Norfolk lavender bags was well received.

Gifts were presented to Don & Christine Langford from the North Wales Photographic Association who have retired from the Championship Committee having been involved with the competition from the outset. Richard Speirs was presented with an "I'm in Charge" badge as he takes over from Rod Wheelans, who retires as Chairman after serving 20 years as Organiser of the competition. In recognition of his hard work Rod was presented with a bottle of whiskey to a standing ovation lasting several minutes.

The Champions were Wigan 10 FC (L&CPU) with Dumfries CC (SPF) in second place. The Terry Chapman Plate Competition was shared by Chichester CC (SCPF) and Rolls Royce (Derby) PF (N&EMPF).

PAGB Great British Trophy (Prints): The Epson GB Trophy was judged on Saturday 19th November in Pontefract. Each print was marked out of 15 and the result based on the aggregate of the best 12 scores. The GB Open Trophy was won by Smethwick PS (MCPF).

The GB Nature Trophy was won by Dumfries CC (SPF). Accepted prints will be exhibited at all PAGB Events.

PAGB Great British Cup (PDI): Entries are now being invited for the 2017 GB Cup which will close on 15th January for judging on 21st/22nd January 2017.

Awards for Photographic Merit – Print & PDI: The November 2016 adjudication saw the introduction of a Central Entry System for the submission of images, compiled by Adrian Lines in early September in time for the November adjudication. The next adjudication will be in Croydon on $22^{nd}/23^{rd}$ April 2017 hosted by the Surrey Photographic Association

Leo Rich, Awards Secretary, is standing down from the Executive at the PAGB AGM in April 2017. I will be seeking election at the PAGB AGM in April to take over from Leo Rich who will be responsible for the April 2017 adjudication and thereafter I take over the reins in preparation for the November 2017 adjudication hosted by the EAF.

Awards for Photographic Merit – AV: There are no plans for an AV Adjudication in 2017.

Patronage: Due to increased prices, it was agreed that medals be increased from £11 to £15 and Ribbons from £1 to £1.05 as from the 2017 AGM.

E-news: Federations are asked to encourage individual club members to sign up for **e-news**. The Federations response to nominate a photographer to feature in e-news was disappointing.

PAGB Handbook: Work on the new Handbook commenced in November 2016 and a potential new printer is being investigated.

Recorded Lecture Service: Once again Stephanie Cook, RLS Secretary, is looking for new lectures, especially Nature, as there has been a further reduction in bookings in 2016.

PAGB Website: Due to major changes in the format of the Website, Mark Buckley-Sharp has taken over responsibility for its daily administration from Ian Lyons who was subsequently thanked for all his hard work expended on the Website over many years.

Insurance Services: Our insurance cover remains with the Royal & Sun Alliance. It was noted that under FSA rules quotations must be obtained from other brokers every five years. At the time of writing the rates for 2017 have yet to be finalised.

Sponsorship & Fundraising: Sponsors now include: Canon, Epson, Sony, Permajet, Fotospeed, Longridge, Wilkinson and Paper Spectrum.

Standards & Governance: A project group has been formed to consider all competition rules to improve harmonisation and to try to establish a standard set of terms and principles on which rules can be created. A report is being prepared for the Executive meeting in February 2017.

RPS: The move of the RPS Collection to the V&A is progressing. The Website is currently being reviewed concerning response speed. An initial bid has been made for new premises in Bath. Recommendations from the Distinctions Review Team are being discussed between Council and the Distinctions Advisory Board and Governance Review is being considered by Council.

Special Event - Nadir Khan and Dianne Owen FRPS Sunday 5th November 2017 Fulbourn Center, Home End, Fulbourn CB21 5BS

Each November the EAF organizes a special event, inviting one or more accomplished photographers to talk to us. This year we have invited Nadir Khan and Dianne Owen to present some of their work and to share some of the background to the images.

Dianne Owen has been producing creative prints from an early age. She gained her ARPS and FRPS in 2008 in Visual Arts and has had her work included in the RPS Folio and the Journal. She runs workshops and lectures and judges locally and







to be a founder member and chairman of the SRGB Group which runs one of the few print-only exhibitions under the auspices of the BPE. Dianne has also given 'Creative Consciousness' solo exhibitions in Merseyside and Lancashire. She always works in prints as 'Holding a print is the final step of any image'.

Nadir Khan's photographic journey started with wrecking his first SLR in a climbing accident. Things could only get better and these days his work is split mainly between adventure sports photography and filming work. Being able to communicate the drama and emotions present in often stressful situations is crucial to this sort of





photography, whether the subjects are bikers, climbers,

runners, kite surfers or whatever. Nadir also runs courses in adventure sports photography, talking about how to compose shots with athletes and how to use off-camera flash, and gives talks to various camera clubs around the country.

Tickets will be £15 for a full day of entertaining imagery plus refreshments morning and afternoon.

This autumn adjudication was held recently in Stirling, hosted by the Scottish Photographic Federation. It was another excellent weekend, efficiently organised by the PAGB team and many members from the Scottish Executive and local clubs. The EAF had 22 applications with 14 successful applicants.

Judges Secretary

November the 13th was the date of the Judges workshop and as the delegates arrived for the day at the Arts Centre in Ware, all was prepared for them by the very willing tutors, assessors and helpers that go to make the day run smoothly.

I will take you through the day as someone (I cannot remember who) said to me that the reason they did not apply to the workshop is that they did not know what went on and did not want to make a fool of themselves by asking, so here goes.

The workshop is split into two groups, the first are those who are judges and are looking to refresh their skills or seek promotion, we do ask that existing Judges attend every 3-4 years to hone their skills. The second group are those that would like to become Judges that are listed in the EAF "C" Panel. This year the new judges were split into two groups.

The day was opened by Mrs Daphne Hanson the EAF president and I then went through what was expected of the prospective new Judges, which can be summed up in the following sentence: -

For those on the new Judges workshop, we are looking for all those things that you look for when a Judge visits your club.

We would hope that anyone applying to come on the course would understand the basics of photography, you do not have to know all the techniques, filters and plugins that are used these days (does anyone?). But a good understanding of composition, lighting, exposure and possibly the techniques used to create the image in front of you will stand you in good stead.

The groups then split to be with their tutor for the day. The tutor is there to guide the delegate; offer advice and listen to the delegate as they are asked to do what Judges do, critique an image. The tutor has with them an assessor who is also another pair of eyes and ears and has the time to write notes as the delegate speaks about the image.

During the day, the delegates will judge/ critique several images both Digitally Projected Images and prints, the delegate is asked to then mark images and then justify that mark given. There is no point in praising an image all though your critique and then giving a mark that bears little or no resemblance to the words you have just spoken.

Most importantly, and the hardest thing to do is, talk to the audience and not the print on the easel, this is a little easier with DPI's as you would normally, depending on the layout of the club, stand well away from the screen and if possible behind the projector.

As we ask the delegates to bring prints with them, there are usually a large number to choose from to be used during the day, of all different standards.

Lunch is taken after two sessions with a coffee break mid-morning and by now some of the delegates are looking slightly shell shocked.

The Existing judges that are on the course go through the same type of

sessions but obviously, we are looking for more from these delegates, we want to know their thought processes and how they arrive at the decisions they have made. Promotion to the next panel is not automatic by just coming on a workshop

The final session in the afternoon is run as if it were a typical camera club competition. The audience (all the delegates from all groups) sit looking at the print easel with the tutors and assessors sitting at tables behind them. All the delegates then have a few minutes to look at the print entry of 40 images before they are called one at a time to critique and mark the image, remembering all the advice they have been given during the day. Talking to the audience and not the print is a must at this stage, (it's still the hardest thing to do). Time permitting the delegates are then given two images at a time, asked to critique both, give a best print of the two and if necessary be prepared to justify the decision they have made.

At approximately five p.m. the EAF President Mrs. Daphne Hanson closed the day and the delegates collect their prints and go home. For the Tutors, Assessors and I this is when the real work starts. We review all the delegates individually and decisions are made as to whom, if any, should be invited to join the EAF "C" panel and if any from the Existing judges are to be promoted. After clearing the halls, we make our way home normally to a glass or two of our favourite tipple as the day can be tiring not only for the delegates but for those running the day as well. Then I as the Judges Secretary have the task of writing to all the delegates on the workshop advising them of the results of the day and their performance, some letters are easier to write than others.

Dear Barry,

I recently stumbled across an old copy of Hertford club's typed Viewfinder for Christmas 1990, that's twenty five years ago. It referred to a slide show I had given, but that is not why I am telling you today. Surprisingly, attached there were excerpts from the Ilford Manual of Photography by C.H. Bothamley, dated as much as 95 years earlier than that, in 1895. That's talking to photographers a hundred and twenty years ago!

And what did the writer say? Same as nowadays, He tells how to put in the sky! Just the technique is a little different. When taking lantern plates of landscapes to be projected the writer expects that the sky is likely to have bleached out. The solution is to make a separate lantern plate showing the required sky, and, for focussing, binding the two plates face to face to keep the sharp images together. But turning over the plate of the sky to do this makes the sky back-wards; therefore one must remember to make the additional plate with the sky reversed in the first place, left to right. It has all been done before.

Separately you may also be interested that 15 gm of magnesium is amply sufficient for an ordinary portrait. To light up a greater space it becomes of greatest importance to spread out the powder into a moderately long strip, and not to pile it in a heap. It should be fired in the middle with a fuse of touch paper, the photographer standing at a safe distance.

For portraits it is in the highest degree desirable that he or she should not know when the exposure is being made, and this end is secured by using a <u>noiseless</u> shutter inside the camera. To use an ordinary lens cap when taking portraits is deliberately to court disaster.

It was probably because to get as quick an exposure as a fifteenth of a second was in those days state of the art. We live and learn!

PHOTO PORTRAIT RULES by Gordon Anderson

When it was seen, back in the nineteen fifties that I was keen on portraiture, friends, wishing to help, variously gave me two basic rules to live by. These I will now tell you.

- 1. Get the eyes two thirds up the picture.
- 2. Take the nose shadow towards the end of the mouth.

The first rule applies pretty generally throughout with people. Of course you can prove me wrong at your pleasure.

The second rule again applies generally, although I daresay they had studio lighting in mind.

Agreed there is always the exception of film stars who wish to stay glamorous longer. To hide shadow lines, put light straight into any recesses using a soft light placed directly over the camera instead of to the side; each time you happen to photograph a film star, that is.

Now if you have got those two basics of Composition and Lighting firmly fixed forever in your mind, at least as starting points, the purpose of this article is to donate to you three more rules of my very own. Be grateful.

This is my A, B, C for you to get right at the very moment of taking.

- A. Don't put the head in the middle of the frame, instead; look at the top of the head as you place the top of the frame.
- B. Focus on the eyes.
- C. Watch the mouth.

As you get the mouth right, you have got your picture. Press that Button, Immediately. Forget anything different. We all agree that so much can be conveyed with the angle and degree of opening or closing the eyes, but beyond that it is the mouth which makes the picture.

P.S. This sample picture I am popping in just to please myself, on the excuse that it could illustrate rules 1 and 2, at least. It reappeared ex file last week, having been taken in Cheshunt Library 35 years ago.

The added interest is that this is the only girl I have ever married in addition to my wife.



It was a deeply moving moment as we posed in Hoddesdon Parish Church for the required photograph, although afterwards on the church steps the bride in white and a passing elderly lady spent a long time comparing their underwear!
