I was sorry to see that over the winter that we have lost a number of EAF member clubs. Details are shown on Page 11.

Such losses are usually a result of dwindling membership or the difficulties of attracting members to join the club committee and take on some of the work.

In a few cases clubs have left because the benefits EAF membership provides is less relevant to the way they now operate. For example if you stop holding competitions, then you don't need judges.

The EAF is developing plans to do more for our smaller clubs. Those of you who were at the AGM in February will know we welcomed two new Executive Committee members, Andy Gutteridge and Colin Bradshaw, both from PICO. I have asked them to develop ideas to do more for our clubs. Also at the AGM, agreement was given to reducing the overall amount we raise in subscription from January 2026, through successful EAF cost management actions. We also agreed to change the way subscriptions are charged next year to make life easier for our smaller clubs.

If you have ideas in your club about new ways the EAF could help please don't hesitate to contact me and let me know.

Turning to more positive things, we have the EAF Print Championship taking place at Fulbourn on 16th March. Seventeen of our leading clubs will be battling it out to win the trophy and represent the EAF at the national PAGB Print Championship in October. We will also have prints from the PAGB's latest 'Masters of Print' event on show. This year one of our judges, Roger Reynolds HonFRPS FBPPA FBPE APAGB, has kindly agreed to give a print talk at the Championship so the day should be a feast for those interested in seeing prints of the finest quality. Spectator tickets are still available - see Page 15.

In May our annual EAF Exhibition is running for the first time at our new venue, the Apex Centre in Bury St Edmunds. The exhibition provides a great opportunity to see inspiring photography. There is still time for EAF Club members to enter work.

#### **CHAMPIONSHIP SECRETARY**


In the EAF PDI Championship on 16th February we had 23 of our leading clubs taking part and after a hardfought event Beyond Group won with 313 points. PICO were second with 299 points, and Bury St Edmunds PS were third with 298 points. Melbourn & DPC also secured the right to represent the EAF at the PAGB Championship at Warwick in July with a fourth place score of 289 points. For the individual awards, the best image was awarded to Robin Lee of Bishops Stortford CC for 'Little Crake', Louise Langley chose 'Sammie Kinghorne in the rain by Peter Milsom of

Beyond Group, Gary Langley chose 'Chambers taking the victory' by Colin Bradshaw of PICO and David Gibbins chose 'Marbled White Pair' by Andre Neves of Melbourn & DPC. I am now looking forward to the Print Championships on 16th March. We have 17 clubs taking part this year. We'll not only see the best of our region, but also some great prints from **Roger Reynolds Hon FRPS FBPPA** FBPE APAGB to accompany his talk. #### AWARDS SECRETARY

Those of you who are familiar with the PAGB APMs know that each of the 15 Federations within the PAGB take it in turn to host the APM weekend. Our last such event was in 2017. The EAF should have been hosting the event this November but due to the Covid pandemic we will be hosting it a year later, over the weekend of 28th - 29th November 2026. There are many of you who already hold one of the five PAGB Accreditations and there are many more (in my opinion) who, with a little encouragement and support, could achieve one of them, whether it is the first one or applying for the next level up. So, give it some thought. As we will be the host Federation it

would be very good to have a healthy

number of applications from you. So, now is the time to start planning. With this in mind we have an Advisory Day planned for Sunday 31st August 2025 at the Foxton Village Hall again, where we will have some of the APM team down from the North-West and Scotland giving up a weekend and offering you their advice. Bookings have already started to come in.

Finally, the books are open for the November 2025 Adjudication which will take place over the weekend of 23rd – 24th November at Kingstonupon-Thames and is hosted by the Surrey Photographic Association. Currently we have three applications. The April 2026 APMs will be held in the Northern Counties, then it's ours in November 2026.

# A JUDGE'S VIEW ALISON JENKINS ARPS DPAGB CPAGB-av BPE1\*



#### How I Became a Judge

Years ago, I joined my local camera club and started participating in competitions. I found myself fascinated by the judge's comments and eagerly applied their suggestions, which significantly improved my photography skills. In those early years, I was greatly inspired by judges like Ron & Maggie Tear, Paul Radden, Naomi Saul, Vic Hainsworth, and Daphne Hanson.

I often assisted at my club and offered advice to others on improving their images. It was suggested to me that I should consider becoming a judge myself. I signed up for the EAF Judges' Workshop but was initially told I wasn't ready to be on a judging panel. Undeterred, I signed up again for the following year. During the interim months, I practiced at my club, aided by Phil Janes, who was also a judge and provided invaluable support. Upon attending the workshop the following year, I was thrilled to be accepted onto the Judges' C panel. I remember my first judging experience at the Chingford club vividly—it was nerve-wracking but immensely enjoyable, and the positive feedback I received only fuelled my enthusiasm.

A few years later, in 2019, I attended another Judges' Workshop to refresh my skills and seek promotion, resulting in my advancement to the Judges' B panel. Last year, in 2024, I again returned to update my skills and sought further promotion, culminating in my promotion to the Judges' A panel. Being promoted to the A panel was a great feeling, as there are only a select few judges at this level within the EAF. This accomplishment has been a long-term aspiration and reaching it has been incredibly fulfilling.

#### Why I Judge

Judging is profoundly rewarding. My primary motivation for judging is to help others and nothing brings me more satisfaction than hearing that my comments were helpful and that participants enjoyed the competition. Judging is not about ego or proving anyone wrong; it's about offering fair and honest feedback, assisting others and providing ideas and inspiration, especially for those new to photography. While it's impossible to please everyone, I strive to offer a balanced range of marks with relevant and supportive comments. Over the years, I have judged various

competitions, including AV, PDI, Print and exhibitions and plan to continue doing so for many more years. I am also part of the Judges' Workshop team, helping to train new judges. I encourage anyone interested to attend a workshop and experience the rewards of judging for themselves.



#### **STARTING IN AUDIO-VISUAL**

If, like me, you've been passionate about photography for many years and have amassed thousands of images, you might wonder what to do with them. One exciting option is to join a dedicated audio visual (AV) group, where you can use your photos to create compelling storytelling sequences.

#### What is an audio visual?

An audio visual production typically combines still images, video, music, sound effects and narration. The producer can incorporate elements like fades, wipes, zooms and other actions to enhance the presentation. It's important to plan the construction of an AV carefully, ensuring it tells a coherent story with a clear beginning and end.

#### How to do it

There are many different types of software available which can be used for making your AV. Most popular among photographers is Pictures to exe. I personally use Adobe Premiere Pro; however, there is also Davinci Resolve and it has a free version with

The EAF has a dedicated AV group called The Essex Audio Visual Group which meets on the first Wednesday each month. Like your camera club, the group has regular lectures and competitions. There are some camera clubs in the EAF which have photographers who have made offshoot AV groups which are part of their main club. The FAF now hosts the annual Audio-Visual Trophy. Last year it was held in October and was an excellent day of competition. I was pleased to win a trophy for the most popular vote. This year the Championship will be held on 5th October at Foxton Village Hall. If you do not want to enter then you are welcome to buy a ticket and come as a guest.

# CLUB PROFILE PHOTOGRAPHIC IMAGING CO-OPERATIVE (PICO)

The group was formed in 2014 by Andy Gutteridge.

As the name suggests, the ethos is a co-operative where members share not only a common interest in photography but also take equal responsibilities in the running and organisation of the group and its activities, and most importantly, to enjoy our chosen hobby.

The club is based in Peterborough, on the very tip of the EAF catchment area, with meetings held every two weeks throughout the year. PICO is not a typical photographic club or Society; it has been deliberately set-up with a view to encourage positive participation in the group's activity. Many of the traditional 'conflict hot-spots', inherent within photographic clubs having been removed at the onset.

As an example, we do not hold

internal competitions amongst our members but prefer to compete as a group while supporting competitions such as those organised by the EAF. The entry for these competitions is decided by the group and every member has the opportunity to input before any selection is finalised. Of course, our hobby is subjective, and we actively encourage even the newest members to express their opinions....and reasoning...before we all mark the images in an open forum. No-one can blame the competition secretary...because its all of us. This system has worked very well, so far. We have won both the EAF Print and PDI Championships and have been honoured to represent the EAF in the Nationals, a real achievement from a small club with a maximum of 12 members.

However, we are conscious that the images of our MPAGB or FBPE members are often selected at the expense of the newer member's work

who may benefit from the feedback score given at these events. We have decided to change this approach in 2025. When supporting the EAF events in the future each PICO member will submit images that will automatically be included in the competition. We feel this approach is more encouraging and inclusive for our membership and this is much more important to PICO than any final event standing. Another primary objective of PICO is to support its members as they work towards an accreditation of their choosing, BPE, FIAP, PSA, RPS or PAGB.

We hold regular image critique nights with the occasional guest invited to give their input too. This positive group approach has been very successful. We have our third member going for their MPAGB, two more knocking on the door of FBPE with the remaining members CPAGB, DPAGB or working on their respective BPE / FIAP levels.

Under our charter, each member is required to organise two events or activities throughout the year. Our members have organised everything from studio shoots to motor sport events and even photographic trips to Valencia, Venice, Lofoten, and

# THE CAMBRIDGE DIGITAL INTER-CLUB COMPETITION 2025

The annual Inter-Club Digital Competition was held at Whittlesford with 29 clubs from the EAF taking part. Cherry Larcombe EFIAP ARPS DPAGB BPE5\* was the judge. There was a tie between Bishop's Stortford CC and PICO, both on 98 points (out of a possible 100) and the winning club was decided by their reserve, tie-break image. First place was awarded to Bishop's Stortford CC.

The Roy Pitman Trophy for the best image was won by Les Cornwell from Loughton CC for his image 'The Thrill of Skateboarding'. The competition was attended by around a hundred spectators from the participating clubs. This year the lead sponsor was Wex Photo Video, represented by Matthew de Salles, who presented vouchers for the winning club and best image.

## THE SPIRIT OF ENGLAND

My inspiration for photographing waxworks came from the work of Japanese photographer Hiroshi Sugimoto, who famously photographed the wax models of Henry VIII and his six wives back in the 1980's. Likewise, I've tried to capture the essence of our history in a unique manner. Through my lens, I have explored the aspects of Madam Tussauds, immortalizing waxworks of historical royalty and celebrities.

They are in my style of photography based on the highly skilled artisans of the wax museum, re-creating absolutely faithful likenesses from the portraits of the old masters and contemporary artists. Using my own research by which the

artist might have painted, I remade the portraits, substituting photography for painting but processing in monochrome on a deep black back-



ground. If my photographs now appear lifelike to you then you should reconsider what it means to be alive here and now (Sugimoto).

With my photographs, I invite you to engage with the fascinating and multifaceted world of my depictions of historical and contemporary figures and witness these waxworks come to life through my lens.

My aim is to make depictions of these people in a style that gives the viewer a visual art experience. The environment at the wax museum is one of crowded mayhem – with hundreds of tourists enjoying the freedom of interacting with models and taking selfies. Sugimoto was able to use a large format camera and had exclusive use of the museum – for me it was hit and miss trying to capture an image amongst the crowds with tripods and flash not permitted. So being able to get up close to take portraits without all the distractions is challenging, not withstanding the very sharp lighting conditions. My process is to select the image and to re-paste it onto a deep black blank file (this strips out the meta data). I use the refine edge tool and blending modes to create the canvas I need. Using NIK software I've endeavoured to soften the skin to produce an image that is not too obviously made of wax.

This began with Ben photographing all the London Underground stations (272), surfacing at each stop to photograph them from the outside, to illustrate just how hard it is to negotiate the service as a disabled traveller.

Before having to use a wheelchair full time, Ben walked - with the aid of sticks and a wheeled walking frame - to the summit of Snowdon, a journey taking sixteen hours to complete.
